

Which Drum-Kit?

Whatever you do, it's going to be noisy! There are three main options: practice pads; electronic kit; acoustic kit.

Practice Pads. These come in a range of prices and styles. The most basic ones are roll-up and they make a basic sound. They are more a toy than a musical instrument, but they may well suffice if space is a real issue, or if a child is uncertain as to whether s/he wants to play long-term. They are cheap (starting from about £30) but before long your child will not be able to do the exercises set by the tutor.

Electronic Kit. These are pretty nearly as good as the real thing (although the experience of striking a pad with a stick is not exactly the same as if it were a real drum). The lay-out is similar to a real drum-kit, so children can easily learn on one and practise effectively on the other. The sound quality is excellent, but you should be warned that they are not totally silent: the player wears headphones, but there is still a good degree of noise produced by the sticks hitting the pads. You can pay a huge amount for one of these, but a good basic starter kit should cost in the region of £200 (although I've seen them from as low as £140).

'Acoustic' Drum Kit These are the real thing and can cost as much money as you have. I suggest you don't get a junior starter kit, but go for a full-size one. Don't be tempted by lots of extra drums: a standard one with bass, snare, toms (2 on the bass drum and one on the floor), along with crash cymbal and hi-hat is all you need. They are noisy though. If you have an attic or a large garden shed, or understanding neighbours, then this is the best option. You should aim to spend upwards of £200, and a further small investment of sound-off pads (£35-ish) will reduce the noise level by about 50%.
